

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Susan and Steve, their boys James and Michael, and Grandpa Joe live in an MVEC Energy Wise home. They save, on average, \$240 a year by participating in MVEC's Energy Wise programs.

Susan checks her email around noon to see if MVEC has scheduled any load management. Since the weather is predicted to be very hot, air conditioners will be cycled on and off 5-8 p.m., so she pre-cools their home.



At night, the family turns off unnecessary lighting and electronics that generate heat and add to the electric bill. Susan resists the urge to turn down the thermostat and re-



members that lowering the fan settings uses less energy.

During the summer months, it's best to run large appliances that emit heat (like clothes dryers and dishwashers) during the late evening when it's cooler.

LEDs vs. Halogen Incandescents

Steve learns that LED lights are more energyefficient than traditional bulbs, so he bought some LEDs at the hardware store during his lunch break. That evening, he can check off changing light bulbs from his To-Do list.

- LEDs typically use about 25%-80% less energy than traditional incandescents, saving you money.
- LEDs have more options for light colors (soft yellow to bright white depending on the room.)
- LEDs can last 3-25 times longer.

After work, Susan comes home, plugs in her electric vehicle and sets it to charge at 10 p.m. Overnight charging rates are less than half price with the EV-24 program.



Steve reads in the co-op newsletter that MVEC has a \$25 rebate for air conditioner and heat pump tune-ups, so he schedules an appointment with his HVAC contractor to get it done.





Grandpa Joe uses a wheelchair. When he wants to change the temp at home, he is thankful he only needs to reach for his phone since



he can't reach the thermostat. He uses the Wi-Fi thermostat program to adjust the temperature before everyone gets home. Wi-Fi Thermostats qualify for a \$50 rebate, and MVEC's program now supports eight major brands.

CEO's Corner By Ryan Hentges


Your partnership helps reduce costs

A foundational aspect of our cooperative business model is **neighbors helping neighbors**. Not only was this true when our cooperative was being built, but it remains true today.

A great example of this cooperation is MVEC's Energy Wise programs. Together, our members enrolled in Energy Wise help reduce the cost of power that MVEC must purchase. In total, around 19,500 members participate in these Energy Wise programs, which have served our cooperative well for years by reducing the need to purchase electricity during high-cost time periods.

This June was an excellent example of the programs' value. As you remember, the temperature reached 90 degrees for seven straight days. The heat significantly increased the amount of electricity used by MVEC members and most consumers in our region. MVEC does not own power generation facilities; instead, we purchase electricity from power providers on your behalf. As the demand for electricity increases, so does the price. Fortunately, MVEC's Energy Wise programs are tools we can use to help manage those price increases.

Do you participate? A complete list of MVEC's Energy Wise programs can be found online at www.mvec.net/energy-wiseprograms. The programs include cycling



air-conditioners, water heaters, and commercial generators. By cycling these appliances, overall energy usage is reduced, and the cost savings are passed on to the participating members.

The red line on the graph below shows the total electricity MVEC members used by hour on Thursday, June 10. The pink line shows what would have been used if the Energy Wise programs were not available. You can see there is a significant difference between

> those two lines; which represents electricity that did not have to be purchased. It is also interesting to note that total system usage at 4 a.m. (the lowest dip) on June 10 was more than peak usage on any day in April.
