The holiday season is a time for reflection, gratitude, and goodwill. While the past year brought challenges, we all pulled together to make our coop and communities stronger. For me


personally during the holidays, I look forward to more time spent with family and friends. We cherish carrying on old family traditions and enjoy creating new ones.

Reasons to apply for Youth Tour 2023 trip to Washington, D.C.

The Washington, D.C. Youth Tour is back and better than ever. This six-day all-expenses-paid youth leadership experience is available to a lucky high school sophomore or junior whose parent or guardian is a member of MVEC. The trip is scheduled for June 13-18, 2023.



1. Represent your local and state community.

MVEC's representative will travel with 40 other Minnesota teens sponsored by their rural electric co-ops. Along with 1,500 national delegates, you will learn how electric cooperatives help power the USA.

2. Experience our Nation's

Capitol. Past trips have included Arlington National Cemetery, Capitol Hill, the Lincoln Memorial, Mount Vernon, the Smithsonian Institution, the U.S. Supreme Court, the Washington National Cathedral and more.


3. Make new friends. Inspired by then-Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, Youth Tour was created in 1958 and now boasts over 50,000 alumni. Many participants have cited the lifelong friendships from all around the country as the best part of the trip.



4. Meet elected officials. Spend a day on Capitol Hill with elected officials and learn how government works. Hear what your legislators have to say and voice concerns.



5. Stand out. Being selected for Youth Tour is a unique accomplishment and a chance to add leadership skills to your college application and work resume.


To date, with your help, MVEC and its members have given over \$2 million back to

ORU Gives Back

"Few people do anything for 27 years," Trustee board president John Miller added. "We are blessed and blown away by Carolyn's commitment and dedication over the years."




Coloring Contest Winners

Qualifications


- Candidates must be members who reside within MVEC's service area.
