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# Did you know? Green transformer boxes power your neighborhoods

As the snow melts and your yard is revealed this Spring, you may ask yourself: what's up with that green box in the corner of my yard?

Also known as a Pad-Mounted Transformer, those green boxes lower high-voltage underground cable to standard voltage used to power electronics, appliances, and lighting. Once voltage is lowered, the transformer safely distributes power to four to eight homes, depending on the electric usage of each house.

The fiberglass base underneath a transformer offers a safe and secure foundation for each unit. While the green box offers a layer of security from the high-voltage lines within, do not climb or play on padmounted transformers.

### What's that hiding in your landscape?



It may be tempting to camouflage transformers with landscaping. If trees, shrubs or flowers are too close, it slows down our lineworker's ability to make repairs and restore power. For safe access to repair and maintain, **cooperative crews need at least 10 feet of clearance at the opening of a pad-mounted transformer and four feet at the rear and sides of the housing.**

Upgrade to an electric thermal storage water heater available directly from MVEC and receive a rebate of \$600. MVEC is now selling Marathon water heaters, one of the most efficient models on the market today.

You must enroll in an Energy Wise water heater program to qualify for the rebate.

#### Pay half-price electric rates!

The initial rebate isn't the only member benefit. MVEC's metered program brings savings throughout the life of the unit as you will pay half-price electric rates.

Signing up for an Energy Wise program requires you to install an energy management switch. The installation needs to be done by an electrician at the member's expense. Your electric water heater will by cycled only during peak electricity usage times.

# **MVEC to retire \$1.78 million in Capital Credits**



Member-ownership at work: Breaking down Capital Credits

form of Capital Credits.

As a not-for-profit cooperative, you are part owner. One member-owner benefit is margins over and above the cost of current-year operations are returned to members as Capital Credits. The amount of electricity a member uses determines the amount of credit received. Each year, the MVEC Board of Directors determines what portion of Capital Credits can be returned back to the membership. Capital Credit amounts vary from member to member and year to year.

#### Think of it as cash back on your electric bill

on electricity usage.

This year, the co-op will distribute \$1.78 million, bringing the total to roughly \$34 million returned since Capital Credits began in 1959.

Current members will see a credit on their March electric bill. Former members who have moved away from MVEC's service area will receive a check, if they have a valid address on file.

Even if someone has moved off cooperative lines, they may be eligible to receive Capital Credits. Every year, refund checks are mailed to former members at their last address on file at MVEC.

Keeping your contact details up to date ensures you receive any Capital Credit refunds you are eligible for. If you are not receiving your Capital Credits, email MVEC your complete forwarding address and phone number with "Capital Credits" in the subject line. Your address will not be changed until you receive a telephone confirmation from MVEC.
